

## **CEO MESSAGE**



The team at St. Vincent de Paul CARES continues to work daily to end homelessness and change the trajectory of the lives we touch. This year, we successfully did so at a rate of over five households per workday. As economic pressures and weather events impacted the people entrusted to our care, we served at unprecedented levels across all programs.

SVdP CARES merged with the Charlotte County Homeless Coalition. The Charlotte County Homeless Coalition was renamed the Charlotte CARE Center, ensuring that the needs of people in that community continued to be met.

During the year, our rapid rehousing team placed 1,184 households into housing. Construction began of Vincentian Village, a \$28 million 73-unit permanent supportive housing apartment complex in Downtown St. Petersburg.

I would like to express my gratitude to the community and our board for their unwavering support as SVdP CARES continues its quest for a community free from homelessness and poverty.





- Broke ground on Vincentian Village in St. Petersburg and Heroes' Village in Sarasota
  - Added a Director of Employee Wellness to enhance staff support
- Completed CARE Center remodel and upgrades to provide industry leading housing focused client care
- Vincentian Legal Services helped over 350 US Veterans with legal challenges to achieve housing stability


# 2023-2024 FISCAL YEAR IN REVIEW





### ENDING HOMELESSNESS

All SVdP CARES programs are built on the belief that everyone has the right to live in dignified and affordable housing. With "Housing First" principles at the core, we have a healthy disregard for all community perceived barriers to housing including employment history, criminal/credit background, mental health, addiction, or religious beliefs. SVdP CARES works to rapidly house those experiencing homelessness within 30 days and concurrently connect them to stabilization and support services to assist with additional needs. Stable housing is the only solution to ending homelessness.

# COMMUNITY THRIFT STORE

Profits from the Community Thrift Store (CTS) support homeless services. Vouchers provide free household goods, clothing, furniture, and other necessities to those being housed by SVdP CARES programs.

\$43,146.00 worth of furniture and clothing were put back into the community, with another \$98,410.00 worth of goods given to anyone in need that walked through the CTS doors.

#### FOOD CENTER

Provides nourishing meals, 365 days a year, to all who are hungry and homeless. The pantry offers youchers for food boxes.
